

First editions of Sir John Franklins (1786-1847), vice-admiral of the Royal Navy dramatic and fascinating records of his two Arctic expeditions, two classic books in 2 vols. of Arctic hardship are offered here together for sale.- Slightly offsetting (also on title-page of 2st vol.), scattered light foxing, otherwise nice wide-margined copies, uniformely bound.

Ad I: First edition of Franklin's first expedition, also known as the Coppermine expedition, intended to survey the western shore of the great inland seas. This expedition started from the shores of Hudson's Bay, to explore the Northern Coasts of America. A total of 5'000 miles were to be travelled on foot and canoe. A series of misfortunes lead to the expedition turning into a failure. Essential boats were lost, the winters were especially harsh and a shortage in food and supplies lead to disaster. On the brink of starvation there were rumours of cannibalism, a murder and an execution, only 8 men out of



nineteen survived the ordeal. Nevertheless the work by Franklin "is an invaluable one for the history of the discovery of the regions and for the interesting descriptions and details of the many tribes of Indians and Esquimaux met with" (Stevens 1706). The story of the Coppermine Expedition was to serve as an influence on Roald Amundsen, who would eventually become the first man to navigate the entire Northwest Passage, as well as the first to reach the South Pole. At the age of fifteen he read John Franklin's account, and decided that he wanted to be apolar explorer.

Ad II: First edition of this scientific account of Franklin's second overland expedition in the years 1825 to 1827. The second expedition started from New York to Fort William in Canada, and explored northwestern Canada to the Mackenzie delta and from there to the unknown northern coast. This expedition was better planned and organized than the first one. It is an eye-witness account of the area, he expounds on the customs, morals, and religion of the inhabitants and includes fascinating material on the shamanism then prevalent there. There is also much additional material, including comparisons between Indians. It is also an important source for the early history of Alaska and also cartography of the area. Franklin's last expedition to find the northwestern passage to the Pacific in 1845 disappeared without a trace. Only recently, 170 years later, were the two ships found and the remains of the expedition discovered.

Beautifully illustrated and complete German edition of Dumont d'Urville's (1790-1842) account on his second expedition to the Pacific. He can be considered "the most celebrated Pacific explorer after Cook ... at heart a frustrated anthropologist, long before the profession had been invented ... " (E.S. Dodge). The Corvette "Astrolabe", with its crew of 79, of which ten died, thirteen deserted, and twenty had to be left behind on various islands, around the Cape of Good Hope, visited a.o., islands in the Pacific, Australia, New Zealand, Tonga, Fiji, and a plethora

of Islands in Sulawesi and the Moluccas. Two of the interesting plates show a.o. Sidney, other include many landscape scenery and ethnografic depictions.- Text and plates slightly foxed, some marginal staining, otherwise a nice copy. Lonchamp 854; cf. Sabin 21210; cf. Lipperheide Mdl2.

First Antwerp edition in Latin. Gonzalez de Mendoza (1545-1618) was sent by Philip II of Spain on an embassy to the Emperor of China. Combined with his own travel experiences notes are made by the missionaries Martin de Herrada and Hieronymus Marin on their voyages to China in 1575 and 1579. This is followed by an account of another missionary journey to China, derived mainly by Martin de Rada. The observations of the travellers refer not only to China, but to those countries through which they passed on their way, and since all expeditions to China at that time used Manila as a base, there is a lengthy account of the Philippines. Besides its interest as an Americanum with ref. to Peru on unn. p. 3, Mexico & Magellan on p. 5 in part 2, and Havana, Jamaica & Santo Domingo, the work contains also descriptions of Japan and other places. According to Pardo de Tavera, this was the first book printed in Europe to mention the then recently founded city of Manila. The werk first appeared in Rome in 1585, printed in Spanish ("Historia de las cosas mas nobles ... del gran reyno de la China"), and is the first printed history on China written by an European. But the first Madrid printing was not until 1586, and at this time an account was inserted of the Espejo expedition to New Mexico, and it is often erroneously assumed that all editions contain this mention, but as all the Italian, Dutch and German translations were made from the original Rome edition, they do not. - A nice copy.

First edition. Dedication copy given by the author to Baron Bernsdorff of an extensive itinerary by J. G. Keyssler (1663-1743), who is regarded as polyhistor and nestor of German protohistory. Keyssler accompanied the young Barons Bernstorff on their journey through the neighboring states of Germany. Almost two thirds of the work are dedicated to Italy, and his descriptions are written in form of 99 letters. This itinerary today offers an authentic soure of geographical features such as monuments, museums, cultural and natural historical landmarks. Keyssler also discusses the political and economical conditions. His work is an important intermediate stage on the way to modern travel reports, since many cultural aspects of all regions and towns are mentioned he visited. The map shows the pass road "Clausen in dem Lueg" near Salzburg mountain regions, Lake Lago Maggiore with 2 folding views of the "Isola Bella", 1 view of "Theatrum Veronense" and 3 natural history illustrations. Volume 2 appeared under the title "Fort-setzung Neuester Reisen". - Due to paper quality slightly browned, otherwise a fine and clean copy.



Pomponius Mela's famous Latin "Geography" of the earliest surviving Latin work on geography, present here in the epochal edition by the great Swiss humanist Joachim von Watt or Vadianus (1484-1551), first published in a textually shorter edition in Vienna, 1518: 23, 132 ff., see VD 16 M 2310). The present second edition is revised and augmented, and is the first to contain the "Loca aliquot" in which Vadianus once more confirmed his modern scientific point of view by critizising the obsolete one of Johannes Camertus. Further more, this second edition contains the famous letters by Vadian to Rudolph Agricola with the suggestion, first made by Martin Waldseemüller, to name the Mundus Novus after Amerigo Vespucci "America" (Ff5 recto). There are probably very few copies known of this present edition which contain the adaption of the 1507 Waldseemüller world map modelled in 1520 by Petrus Apian, and printed by him in Vienna for the Solinus edition c. 1520 under the title "Tipus Orbis Universalis" (c. 410 x 290 mm). " ... Some bibliographers have claimed that it belongs to the book. This, however is a matter of doubt. The text contains no allusion to such a map, and it is probable that the book was issued without it" (Sabin after Harisse). As was the trait at this time as well as being sold separately: There is, however some doubt as to whether the Apianus map, published in Vienna for the Solinus in 1520, was originally issued with this Basel 1522 edition of Mela. The copies of this present book edition from 1522 in Basel and Munich do not have the Apian map bound in. Anyhow, copies of this Apian map in the collections of the University Library Basel and the Bayerische Staatsbibliothek Munich are catalogued separately.

This present edition is also interesting for the history of Alpine exploration, containing Vadianus' description of the first ascent of mount Pilatus near Lucerne, accomplished by him in the summer 1518 accompanied by his humanist friends Johannes Xylotectus, Oswaldus Myconius, and Conrad Grebelius (p. 34). The importance of Mela's work, which Petrarca and Boccaccio held in high esteem, which Cabal -the discover of Brazilworked through meticulously, and which has been used as a schoolbook for centuries since early modern times, is also evident to todays's readers: Not only Trier, the Taunus mountains, parts of the Lake Constance, Scandinavia, etc. are metioned here for the first time. The architectural title border, signed and dated "1519 HF, ', is attributed to Hans Furtenbach, a contemporary of Urs Graf with whom he shares stylistic characteristics. It shows the figure of "Hercules Gallicus" beneath the title, the figures of Lucretia on the left and Judith on the right, both standing above Andreas Cratander's Occasio-device. The head of the frame shows, from left to right, the young Occasio again, an old woman as Penitence, and a rich man. The frame of the title to part II shows putti playing and sea



monsters, in the two vertical columns of grotesques Cratander's Occasio. This border in the style of Hans Holbein style is most probably by Hans Franck. Both borders were first used by Cratander for his edition of Gellius' "Noctes Atticae" in 1519. Charles Philipp Theodore von der Pfalz (1724-1799), since 1777 Elector of the Palatinate branch of the House of Wittelsbach was a patron of the arts, and the promoter of the first German National Theatre at Mannheim, under the direction of Dalberg and Iffland, and founder of the Mannheim Academy of Sciences in 1763. He was a beautifier of the new capital Mannheim and builder of the Castle of Schwetzingen. After a separation of centuries he was able to reunite the Palatinate with Bayaria and moved to Munich. - Ms. library inscription on first flyleaf verso, small stamp at foot of title, two tiny stains to title border, minor spotting to first leaves, last text leaf with restored tear in top margin slightly affecting the head-line, some old ms. marginal annotations or underlinings. First edition. A famous account on the first trade mission of the Dutch East India Company to the Emperor of China by Pierre de Goyer and Jacob de Keyser, who left Batavia on 14 July 1655 and returned on 31 March 1657.

Nieuhoff (1618-1672) was of German birth, but devoted much of his life to the service of the Dutch East India Company, spending nine years in Brazil. He then went out to China, was governor of Ceylon, returned to Holland and then departed again for the Far East. He died in Madagascar. The present book is extraordinarily rich in its depictions of landscapes, seaports, towns and cities, as well as plants and animals and costumes. According to Tiele, the plate of Paolinxi

called for in the Instructions to the Binder, is not found in most

This present collection of reports is from the Jesuit missions in Goa and the Eastern Indies, Pegu (Burma), Malacca and other areas close to Japan brought together by Father Nicolau Pimenta (1546-1614). He was a Portuguese Jesuit and visited Japan in 1599. Editor was the Dutch theologian Johannes Busaeus (1574-1611), who died at Mainz.

On behalf of the theologian Christian Walch he describes the activities of the Bohemian Brethren and shows here the remarkable quality of them. As a highly talented wandering missionary and restless crisis manager he worked for colony projets in the West Indies on the Island of St. Thomas, and in Georgia, Pennsylvania, and North Carolina, a.o.

Ad I: First German edition of Joh. Chr. Wagner's well-known description of the Orient which helped shape the Western world's image of Muslims. It was written after the Ottomans were defeated in 1683. Wagner from Nuremberg (1640-c. 1701) was a theologian and a scholar. It seems that he has emigrated to Augsburg in 1683. He never traveled himself but devoted most of his life to geographical studies.

The illustrations in this present incomplete work show views of cities, costumes, the Great Wall, a.o. Some engravings are partly copied after Kirchner's ,'China" since in the China literature of the 17th century illustrations are rather rare. A few illustrations were done by H. Irnsinger, J. Chr. and Melchior Haffner, Ulm artists. Most of the views are lacking.

First edition. A nice copy of this precious and classic work on Switzerland, with fine views drawn by Bertaux, Besson, Brandoin, Chatelet, S.H. Grimm, Le Barbier, Perignon, a.o., and engraved by Nee, Niquet, Alix, de Longueil, Dequevauviller, Droyer, Borguet, Masquelier, Choffard, Aveline, a.o. Many leaves have two or more engravings, the numbering is sometimes repeated, sometimes there are several numbers on one leaf. There are 7 double-page maps (included in the numbering) by Clermont, one after Daniel Bruckner, one a view after B. A. Dunker. The plate volume has, on half-title verso, the portrait-medallions of Zurlauben and Laborde (no. 278 in the plate index). The majority of plates show picturesque views of the most famous places in Switzerland, some show historical events, portraits of eminent citizens, coins and seals, etc. Zurlauben (1720-1799) published the first volume anonymously making it seem is if it was Laborde's work. The second volume with a slightly different title bears Zurlauben's name. His monumental work offers a wealth of facts about Switzerland, and is a testimony to his vast erudition. He cites sources and writes with ease, but with a serious approach which earned him the esteem of fellow scholars at home and abroad. The work is dedicated to the count of Artois, Colonel-General of Switzerland.
